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A Word from Father Justin

The Season of Epiphany

In the Episcopal Church, the season of **Epiphany** begins on **January 6**, following the twelve days of Christmas, and continues until **Ash Wednesday**,



marking the start of Lent. It is a time of celebration and reflection on the revelation of Jesus Christ to the world, particularly to the Gentiles, as symbolized by the visit of the Magi.

There are four key themes of the season: 1. The Manifestation of Christ: Epiphany emphasizes Jesus as the light of the world, revealed to all people, not just to Israel. This is highlighted through the readings and themes of the season. 2. The Visit of the Magi: January 6 specifically commemorates the Magi's journey to Bethlehem, symbolizing Christ's manifestation to the Gentiles. 3. Jesus' Baptism: The first Sunday after Epiphany focuses on Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River, where the Holy Spirit descended upon him and God proclaimed him as His beloved Son. 4. Christ's Ministry and Miracles: The Sundays following Epiphany explore stories of Jesus' early ministry, including the Wedding at Cana, the calling of the disciples, and other events where his divinity and mission were revealed.

The **Theological Significance** of the season of Epiphany is a time for reflecting on the universal nature of Christ's mission and the call for Christians to spread his light to the world. It emphasizes mission, outreach, and the transformative power of Christ's presence in both personal and communal life. Each week reveals a different aspect of Jesus' divinity and his purpose on Earth. Themes include: Light in Darkness: Jesus as the light overcoming spiritual darkness, inviting the church to reflect on its role in sharing that light. Inclusivity and Mission: The Magi symbolize the Gentiles, showing that salvation is for all people, not just Israel. **Baptismal Renewal:** The celebration of Jesus' baptism inspires Christians to remember their own baptismal covenant.

There are three main points that I would like to focus on, as we move in this new season.

1. The Feast of the Epiphany (January 6): This marks the beginning of the season and commemorates the visit of the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12). Churches often include a procession symbolizing the journey of the wise men. The story highlights Jesus being revealed as the Savior to the Gentiles, emphasizing the universality of his mission.

2. **The Baptism of Our Lord** (First Sunday after Epiphany): Celebrates Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (Matthew 3:13-17, Mark 1:4-11, or Luke 3:15-17, 21-22).

The day affirms Jesus as the Son of God and often inspires reflection on the meaning of baptism and renewal of baptis-

mal vows.

3. Blessing of Chalk and Home Blessings: A longstanding tradition in some Episcopal parishes

is the blessing of chalk. Congregants take the chalk home to inscribe a blessing above their doorways, such as "20+C+M+B+24" (for the year and the traditional initials of the Magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar).

Scripture Readings for the Season:

The Revised Common Lectionary guides the readings for Sundays during Epiphany. Below are key readings that may appear during this time:

1. The Visit of the Magi (Epiphany Day):

• OldTestament:Isaiah60:1-6 — "Arise, shine; for your light has come."

• Epistle: Ephesians 3:1-12 — Paul speaks of the mystery of Christ being revealed to the Gentiles.

• Gospel:Matthew2:1-12—The Magi follow the star to Jesus.

- 2. **The Baptism of Our Lord** (First Sunday): • OldTestament:Isaiah42:1-9 — The servant
- of the Lord is alight to the nations. • Gospel:Matthew3:13-17,Mark1:4-11, or

Luke 3:15-17, 21-22 — The baptism of Je sus and God's proclamation.

3. Other Sundays in Epiphany:

 The Wedding at Cana(John2:1 11):Jesus'firstmiracle, revealing his glory.
 Calling of the Disciples (John 1:43-51, Mark 1:14-20):Jesus gathers followers to begin his ministry





The eighth day of Christmas, the eighth day of Creation, the Next New Day, New Year's Day.




As you let go of the year past, may you ... in your free fall find yourself held by an eternal love that has come ages to be with you,
